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
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se-ques-trum (sə-kwēs'trəm) [L.]

1. any tissue that has become sequestered. 2. a piece of dead bone that has become separated during the process of necrosis from the sound bone.

corneal sequestrum, a condition in cats in which a section of corneal stroma becomes dark colored and sometimes detached; it may be due to a herpesvirus infection or to tissue irritation from a disease process. Called also [corneal sequestration](#).

primary sequestrum, a sequestrum that is entirely detached.

secondary sequestrum, a sequestrum that is partially detached and may be pushed into place.

tertiary sequestrum, a sequestrum that is separated by only a slight dividing line and remains in its place.

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
