**con-dy-lo-ma** (kon "d<sub>2</sub>-lo'm<sub>2</sub>) [\(mp3/23547.mp3\)](#) [ Gr. kondylōma, knuckle or knob ]

1. a warty growth on the skin or a mucous membrane. 2. [c. acuminatum \(def.jsp?id=100023548\)](#). [condyloma acuminatum](#), a type of [papilloma \(def.jsp?id=100077986\)](#) usually found on the mucous membrane or skin of the external genitals or in the perianal region. Lesions are usually few in number but may aggregate to form large cauliflowerlike masses. Caused by the [human papillomavirus \(def.jsp?id=100078009\)](#), it is infectious and autoinoculable. Called also [acuminate \(def.jsp?id=100117017\)](#), [genital \(def.jsp?id=100117025\)](#), or [venereal wart \(def.jsp?id=100117042\)](#).

**flat condyloma**, [c. latum \(def.jsp?id=100023551\)](#).

**giant condyloma**, [Buschke-Löwenstein tumor \(def.jsp?id=100112130\)](#).

**condyloma latum**, a cutaneous manifestation of [secondary syphilis \(def.jsp?id=100105133\)](#), consisting of a broad, flat syphilitic condyloma, usually found in a warm, moist, intertriginous area, such as around the anus or external genitals. It may become hypertrophic and erode to form a soft, red mass with a moist, weeping surface. Called also [flat c. \(def.jsp?id=100023549\)](#)
**pointed condyloma**, [c. acuminatum \(def.jsp?id=100023548\)](#).
