About Exotropia

What is Exotropia?

Most Common Type: Intermittent Exotropia




Illustration: one eye is turning outward, so both eyes do not see the same target.

What is Exotropia?

Exotropia -- a common type of strabismus -- is the outward deviation of an eye (away from the nose). The deviation or eye turn may occur while fixating (looking at) distance objects, near objects or both.

When the eye turns outward at all distances and at all times, it is called **constant exotropia**. When the eye turns outward only sometimes, it is called **intermittent exotropia** or **alternating exotropia** When BOTH eyes turn outward or fail to converge normally (turn inward to see), this is called <u>Convergence Insufficiency</u> and/or <u>Exophoria</u>.

Sometimes, There's Good News Intermittent Exotropia
