biliary dyskinesia, sphincter of Oddi dysfunction (def.jsp?id=118250512).**dyskinesia intermittens**, disability of the limbs, coming on intermittently, and due to impairment of the circulation.**orofacial dyskinesia**, facial movements resembling those of tardive dyskinesia, seen in elderly patients who are edentulous a syndrome (def.jsp?id=100104455).**paroxysmal kinesigenic dyskinesia**, brief episodes of dyskinesia caused by sudden movements, hyperventilation, or a sudd**primary ciliary dyskinesia**, any of a group of hereditary syndromes characterized by delayed or absent mucociliary clearance there is also lack of motion of sperm. One variety is **Kartagener syndrome** (def.jsp?id=100104337). Called also **dyskinetic** (def. immotile cilia syndrome (def.jsp?id=100104309).**tardive dyskinesia**, an iatrogenic extrapyramidal disorder caused by long-term use of antipsychotic drugs; it is characterized t dyskinesias that usually resemble continual chewing motions with intermittent darting movements of the tongue; there may als movements of the extremities. It is more common in women than in men and in the elderly than in the young, and incidence is and duration of treatment. In some patients symptoms disappear within a few months after the drugs are withdrawn; in others : indefinitely.
