prohibit 🐠









VERB (prohibiting, prohibits, prohibited)

WITH OBJECT

1 Formally forbid (something) by law, rule, or other authority. 'all ivory trafficking between nations is prohibited'

1.1 Formally forbid someone from doing something.

1.2 (of a fact or situation) make (something) impossible; prevent. 'the budget agreement had prohibited any tax cuts'

Origin

Late Middle English: from Latin prohibit- 'kept in check', from the verb prohibere, from pro- 'in front' + habere 'to hold'.
